Organizing – a Tough Job that Pays Great Dividends

Negotiations are coming up this year. If you have any ideas or suggestions on how we can improve our agreement, please give us a call at the hall. Cesar and I are working to help clean up the agreement book and improve the working conditions for all our members. A couple things that are definitely going to be addressed are Health and Welfare and Pension funds. We need to ensure these funds stay solvent. More importantly, we need to ensure these benefits continue to be in existence for many years. In today's economy, these funds took severe hits and we need to recuperate.

Despite the economic downturn, we can still get out of this rut and continue to be a strong union. Unions must continue to grow if we want to uphold our wages and benefit standards, which is increasingly difficult to do if the non-union continues to grow and become our rival competitor. Organizing or union growth is not an easy undertaking. It requires substantial expenditure in money, resources, staffing and time. However, you can play a winning role in the Ironworkers' organizing effort.

There are numerous benefits – many of which are enjoyed not only union members, but by every working American – that we need to keep fighting for. For more than 80 years, Workers Compensation laws have benefitted millions of temporarily or permanently disabled workers. Unemployment insurance has become law as part of the Social Security Act. The National Labor Relations act of 1935 gave workers the legal right

to join a union. Another example is the Civil Rights Act of 1965, which the AFL-CIO strongly supported to secure passage. Unions fought hard for Private Pension Funds and the enactment of the Employment Retirement Income Security Act known as ERISA. And of course OSHA was passed in Congress in 1970 to ensure Health and Safety protections.

The benefits mentioned are not given – they are earned by every hard-working union member. Our benefit and wage standards are always under threat of being cut. To combat this we must ORGANIZE. We need volunteers for house calls to non-union workers – you and your co-workers are the most qualified to ensure best results. You have a simple message that explains why you are giving your time to volunteer: it is important for non-union workers to join a union to get the same higher wages and benefits as us. Otherwise, they will be competing with each other in a race to the bottom.

Elections for Delegates to the International Convention will be held at the hall in May, 2011. If you want to attend the convention you must be nominated in the April union meeting and be current with your union dues for the last two years. Please call the hall for more information.

Jack Gavett - Apprenticeship

There still seems to be a lot of confusion about renewing of welding certifications. The International will renew your certification at no cost if you send to them your continuity log book, properly filled out and on time.

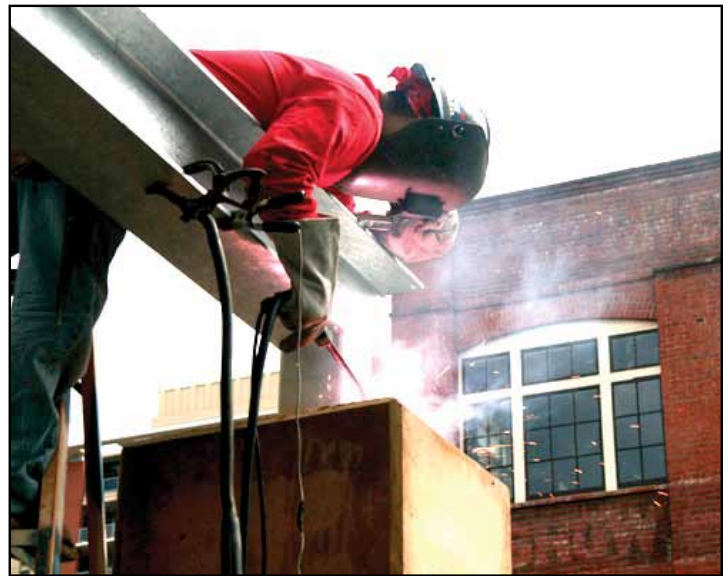
Most of the rejections are for incorrectly filling out the date for the first and second six months on the form. Note that the International will only accept the gray log book issued by them; they will not accept the blue log books issued by the local.

It is important to list the contractor that you worked for on the form and have the inspector, CWI or superintendent sign it. For example, you receive a certification in September – the first six months will be any time from September to March; the second six months will be any time from March to September. The form needs to be copied and sent to the International by the end of September to renew.

If you are having a problem with your forms, call the apprenticeship office **before** your certifications expire. There is nothing we can do after the expiration date except charge you a \$25 fee to retake each test.

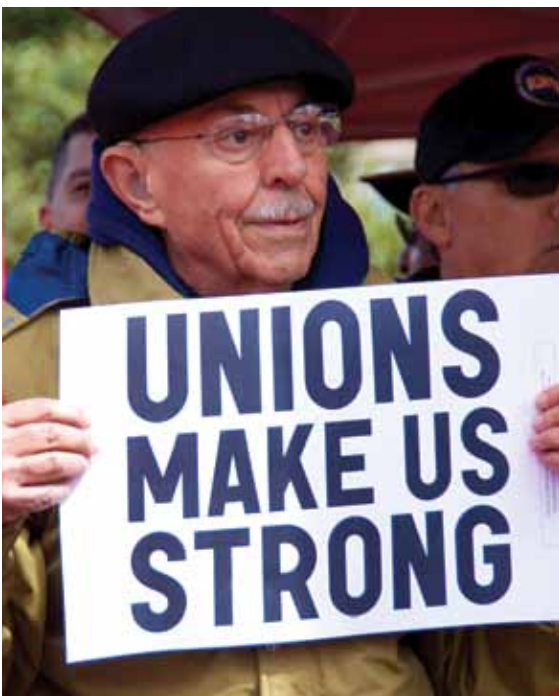
