## **Q. What kind of training do union Ironworkers get?**

**A.** Apprentices get 160 hours of classroom instruction every year – including college-level classes – for four years. Classes such as structural steel, architectural steel and welding are each 50 hours – 30 hours of classroom instruction, 20 hours of hands-on lab or shop training. Journeymen continue their education through a wide array of upgrade classes in welding, rigging and more.

## **Q. How much does the union invest in training?**

**A.** The International Association of Bridge, Structural, Ornamental and Reinforcing Iron Workers Union spends more than \$47 million annually on training. The union invests heavily in its members, and contractors benefit from that investment. There are nine training centers in Arizona, California and Nevada that make up The University of Iron.

## **Q. Why should I hire union Ironworkers?**

**A.** The District Council of Iron Workers of the State of California and Vicinity turns out the most skilled and dependable workers in California, Arizona and Nevada.
